No. 2 Republican in House indicted

WASHINGTON Representative Tom DeLay of Texas, the powerful House Republican majority leader, was accused by a Texas grand jury Wednesday of criminal conspiracy in a campaign fund-raising scheme.

DeLay, the No. 2 leader in the House, was indicted on one count charging that he violated state election laws in 2002. Two political associates, John Colyandro and James Ellis, were indicted with him.

Because he was indicted, DeLay stepped down as majority leader, as he was required to do under House Republican rules. The Republicans then selected Representative Roy Blunt of Missouri, the current Republican whip - No. 3 in the leadership ranks - to fill the vacancy

temporarily, The Associated Press reported.

A conviction on the felony charge against DeLay carries a maximum sentence of two years in prison. The lawmaker has consistently maintained his innocence and on Wednesday asserted that the indictment resulted from a "purely political investigation" by the Travis County district attorney, Ronnie Earle, a Democrat.

"I have done nothing wrong," DeLay said, adding that he had violated "no law, no regulation, no rule of the House."

Speaking on Capitol Hill, DeLay described Earle, a longtime antagonist, as "a partisan fanatic" and a "rogue district attorney." DeLay said the charge lodged against him Wednesday was "one of the weakest, most baseless indictments in American history," one that is "a sham, and Earle knows it."

Earle, in a separate news conference, disputed DeLay's contentions and said that it was his duty to go after "abuses of power." In fact, he said, he has prosecuted more Democrats than Republicans.

At the White House, the president's chief spokesman, Scott McClellan, expressed support for DeLay, telling reporters, "Mr. DeLay is a good ally and a leader who we have worked closely with for the good of the American people."
